### Hare coursing – what to do if you've been affected

We have recently seen an increase in Hare Coursing across the East Riding and North Lincolnshire involving persons with dogs trespassing on land in search or pursuit of hares.

Illegal hare coursing is a UK Wildlife Crime Priority and a Priority for the Rural Task Force.

The criminality involved is serious, organised and sophisticated in their planning often involving cross border offending. Not only does it involve barbaric acts against protected wildlife species. but it causes harassment, alarm, distress and annoyance to the rural communities.

Poachers do not care about trespassing across farmland, intimidation to farmers and landowners, and the damage they cause. However, they do care about the zero tolerance response that Humberside Police have towards their illegal activities.

This week with the assistance of Wildlife Crime Officers from Patrol and Neighbourhood Teams, we have seized two vehicles, recovered hare coursing equipment and reported two males who reside out of force for hare coursing related offences.

The NFU have recently published advice for landowners and farmers on how to prevent hare coursing on your land and what to do if you have issues with hare coursing.

### **Crime Prevention**

Humberside Police are warning people to be careful after reports of fraudsters selling fake listings and written off cars on Facebook Marketplace.

Fraudsters often post listings for cars that look too good to be true, such as a nearly new model at a suspiciously low price. Always compare prices for similar cars to spot deals that might be too good to be true

Don't let anyone pressure you into paying upfront – you should only hand over money once you've seen the car in person and you're happy with it

Make sure you carry out all the usual checks before buying a car. A HPI is especially important when buying privately, as it will show if the car has been stolen, written off, scrapped, or has any outstanding finance

A low price can be a red flag for fraud, like fake listings, damaged cars being misrepresented, or tricks to get you to send money before you've even seen the car.

### Tips to stay safe:

- · Beware of Suspicious Deals: If a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is.
- · Do Your Due Diligence: Research the seller and the vehicle to confirm their legitimacy.
- Report Suspicious Activity: If you encounter a suspicious listing or seller, report it to Facebook to help them identify and remove scam accounts.
- · Stolen Car Images: Scammers use photos of cars they don't own to create fake listings and entice buyers.
- See the Car First: Always inspect the car in person and take it for a test drive before handing over any money.
- · Meet Safely: Arrange to meet the seller in a safe, public place, and consider bringing a friend.
- · Check the price. Most of the scam adverts are "selling" cars at around 1/4 of their actual value.
- · Do not be pressured to use unusual payment methods such as gift cards

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### Buying a bike for Christmas, have you thought about a lock for it?

As we have passed the middle of November, I hope it isn't too early to mention Christmas, or what is being bought for Christmas, I also don't want to point out that it is only 5 weeks away!!!!

At this time of the year, people have either bought, or are buying bikes to give as Christmas presents, and with the average price to buy a bike now around £350+ and an e-bike around £1900+ it is not a cheap present to buy.

Whilst a lot of thought is given towards the cost of the bike itself, one thing that isn't often considered is the purchase of a suitable lock for the bike.

Across England and Wales there are over 77,000 bikes stolen annually, that is around one bike every seven minutes, and this is only the bikes that are reported stolen.

Bike thieves are normally opportunists, who will visit areas and identify bikes they want to steal using a variety of methods, such as cutting or grinding off locks. They will often attack the bikes that are left unlocked, or have the weakest locks, as they are the easiest to cut off, and take the shortest amount of time. A lock with a high level of security can also act as a deterrent and can prevent an attack.

So, what should you look for when looking at buying a bike lock.

The general rule of 'you get what you pay for' does fit. The £2 wire locks will provide a much lower level of security than a lock that costs £25.

The rule of thumb is that you should consider spending around 10% of the cost of the bike on a lock, although I would advise you buy the best lock that you can afford, which may be more or less than that.

I have attached information that will advise which standard of lock would be best for the type of bike that has been bought.

### Here are some tips on how to reduce the risk of a bike being stolen.

- · Use the best quality locks you can buy; I recommend Sold Secure Gold Standard locks or above.
- · Only leave your bike if you really need to, but if you do, try and leave it in a public area that is covered by CCTV.
- · If you are able, lock your bike using 2 quality locks to a bike stand, this will allow you to also lock the wheels and prevent them from being stolen, as most bikes now come with quick release wheels.
- · Register your bike with <u>Bike Register</u> and get it security marked, local Neighbourhood Policing Teams across Humberside, regularly hold marking events, where you can get your bike marked for free.
- · Remember to also lock your bike up at home as well, ideally to a solid wall or ground anchor.

I hope this information helps you choose the right lock for the bike you are buying.

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### Black Friday Bargains? Think Battery Safety First

With Black Friday deals and festive shopping in full swing, many of us are unboxing shiny new gadgets and electronics. But have you thought about the batteries inside them?

Lithium-ion batteries power everything from phones and laptops to e-bikes, toys and vapes. While safe when used correctly, they can cause serious fires if damaged, charged incorrectly or disposed of carelessly. Fires linked to these batteries are rising across the UK. They start suddenly, burn at extreme temperatures and release toxic fumes.

### Stay safe this season:

- · Buy smart: Avoid cheap, unbranded batteries or chargers from online marketplaces. Stick to trusted retailers.
- · Charge safely: Never charge near exits or on beds and sofas.
- Don't leave charging unattended: Especially overnight.
- **Check for damage:** Stop using batteries that are swollen, leaking or overheating.
- · Recycle responsibly: Never throw batteries in household bins. Use your local recycling centre.

Extra Black Friday warning: Tempting discounts can lead to risky purchases. Counterfeit batteries often lack essential safety features. If a deal looks too good to be true, it probably is.

### Are you buying a smart device for Christmas?

Below are 5 tips that will assist in making your 'SMART' Christmas present more difficult to hack into, and thus, keep your device and information safer.

- Make sure you use strong passwords and certainly don't keep default passwords on your devices. The best passwords involve the use of 3 unrelated words. See the attached sheet for examples.
- · Look at changing the default administrator credentials on your Wi-Fi router and change the issued password. The use of a WPA2 encryption will also disguise the network from immediate view.
- · Ensure that you keep the operating systems on your devices up to date, a lot of these updates also contain security patches. So, when you get a notification that there is an update available, make sure you install it.
- · Keep any software/apps that are on your SMART devices up to date, as updates could also contain security patches.
- · Consider using a firewall/anti-virus system that will monitor and block any attempts to access your devices.

### Knife crime stats update

The new figures show a 10% reduction in offences under this government across the seven police forces most impacted by knife crime, with areas like West Midlands seeing a 30% drop, following targeted policing efforts.

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### **Abolition of Police and Crime Commissioner Role**

Today, the Government has announced a significant reform to policing governance: the role of Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) will be abolished from 2028. This decision marks the end of a system introduced in 2012 to enhance accountability and give communities a direct voice in policing.

Under the new arrangements, oversight of policing will transfer to directly elected mayors, their deputies, or newly established Police and Crime Boards, reflecting a model closer to the former police authorities. This change is part of a broader strategy to streamline governance, reduce duplication, and ensure resources are focused on frontline policing.

Jonathan Evison, Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside said "While today's announcement signals the end of the PCC role, our commitment to public safety remains unchanged. Until 2028, we will continue to deliver on our Police and Crime Plan, hold the Chief Constable to account, and ensure that the voices of our communities are heard. We will work closely with government and local leaders to guarantee a smooth transition that strengthens policing and keeps people safe.

"Importantly, I want to reassure victims of crime that service provision and support will remain at the highest standards throughout this transition."

What happens next?

- The transition will begin immediately, with full implementation by 2028 when current PCC terms end.
- · Areas with existing combined authority mayors already operate under this model and will likely serve as templates for the change.
- · The Home Office will publish detailed guidance on managing the transfer of responsibilities to ensure continuity and maintain public confidence in policing.

"I want to reassure the public that business will continue as usual during this transition. All core services—including emergency response, crime investigation, victim support, and community safety initiatives—will remain fully operational. Our teams are committed to maintaining high standards of service delivery, and there will be no disruption to policing or public safety."

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





