RECIPE FOR CLASS 21

CHOCOLATE STOUT CAKE

Ingredients

For the cake:

300ml stout
150g dark chocolate
200g butter
500g soft light brown sugar
4 eggs
350g self raising flour

For the icing:

400g cream cheese (full fat)
25ml Stout
200g icing sugar

To garnish:

Dark chocolate, grated

Method

Preheat the oven to 160°C.

Melt the chocolate and butter with Guinness over a bain marie.

Cool slightly, then whisk in the eggs and sugar, then fold in the flour.

Line a 25cm deep cake tin with greaseproof paper, pour the cake mix in and bake for 1 hour.

Remove from the oven and leave to cool.

To make the icing, whisk together the cream cheese, icing sugar and Guinness. Pour the icing onto the cake, spread with a palette knife for an even thickness, then grate the chocolate over the top.

Riot in Wold Newton

Don't worry it was over two hundred years ago. In 1824 a number of men were charged with rioting and unlawful assembly in Wold Newton. I've not found the cause of the unrest but during that period, such charges were often linked to social unrest caused by economic hardship, political movements, or disputes over land rights, especially in rural England.

Freak Summer Snow Storm

I recently read a report about an unusual August snowfall that was localised in Wold Newton. It apparently caused significant damage to grain and root crops and buried animals in snowdrifts. The report also mentioned that day trips were organized, from Bridlington, for visitors to see the area and experience the stunning mini Switzerland-like landscape.

I don't have a specific date for this event, but it's on my list of things to research. While it seems highly unlikely that such a significant snowfall would occur in August, it is not entirely impossible.

Could this be a folkloric tale, or did it actually happen? Have you heard of this event?

Thwing & Octon Playing Field in Danger of Closing

A three-pronged threat may shut down the playing field.

The Thwing & Octon Playing Field has been with us for more than a quarter of a century. It was initially funded with a lottery grant and is managed by a small group of dedicated volunteers who ensure its maintenance, safety, and functionality. Their tireless efforts involve everything from grass cutting to constant fund-raising to pay for the high costs of insurance and upkeep. For example, the soft fall area (*the section of woodchips*) requires approximately £1500 to be found each time the chips are replenished.

Threat 1

Refurbishment needed

Although it has served well, the play equipment now needs to be completely replaced. Time and wear have taken their toll, and ever-changing safety standards means equipment that once met all safety standards and requirements, is now no longer fully compliant. Although not yet properly costed, the refurbishment will cost tens of thousands of pounds which means a massive fund-raising drive.

Threat 2

Lack of volunteers

A shortage of volunteers has hindered the ability to meet the demands of maintaining the playing field. For the renovation of the area to proceed successfully, additional volunteers are essential to support its future upkeep and to organise fund-raisers to cover the yearly costs involved. Without sufficient volunteer involvement, the renovation initiative will not be viable.

Threat 3

Diminishing usage

Over the years, the use of the playing field has declined. The reasons are unclear. It could be fewer children in the area or improvements to nearby play areas attracting people away. This raises the question of whether it is worth investing tens of thousands into something that may only serve a small number of individuals.

All Saints' Church Thwing - Date Stone

In an earlier edition of the newsletter, I brought up the mystery of the date stone above the north entrance to All Saints Church in Thwing. The stone appears to have two names and a date featured on it. It reads: "ROBERT ROPPER JOHN STEVENSON 1686"



After asking around locally, it seemed that nobody had any idea of who these two individuals were, yet in their day they must have been people of some significance. I decided to dig a little deeper.

First, I went to the Treasure House Archive Service in Beverley. They provided limited information but confirmed that both Robert Roper of Octon and John Stevenson of Thwing were yeomen who served as churchwardens in 1686. Thus, the date stone seems to commemorate their service to the church. A yeoman, according to Britannica, is a class between the gentry and the labourers; a yeoman was usually a landholder.

Next, I made enquiries at the Borthwick Institute for Archives. They did not find many details but there was a John Stephenson of Thwing who was listed as a witness to a case of violation of church rights (pew disputes). Unfortunately, this was dated 1668 and John's age listed as 70. This makes it unlikely though still possible that this was the same man.

Robert Roper I've had a bit more luck with. His name pops up on a lease agreement from 1674, for property in

Octon. It also looks like he had a daughter called Anne Roper (Roper) who married Christopher Lamplugh and gave birth to Thomas Lamplugh.

Thomas Lamplugh became Archbishop of York and is remembered on another stone in the church.

This is as far as I have managed to get but there is scope for a lot more investigation and verification.

Know the Fire Risk

Emollient Skin Products

UK Fire and Rescue Services, in partnership with the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA), the National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC), and health charities, are raising awareness about the hidden fire risks associated with emollient skin creams.

These creams, commonly used for conditions such as eczema and psoriasis, can build up on fabrics like clothing and bedding. When dried on, they create a highly flammable combination that can ignite easily and burn rapidly, posing a severe risk of injury or death. Alarmingly, this risk exists regardless of whether the creams contain paraffin.

Who is Most at Risk?

Since 2010, more than 50 deaths and serious injuries have been linked to fires caused by dried-on skin creams. Research shows that the most vulnerable include:

- ✓ People over 60 years old
- ✓ Smokers
- ✓ Individuals with reduced mobility

How to Stay Safe

To reduce fire risks while using emollient products, please follow these essential safety guidelines:

✓ Always:

- Always change and wash clothing and bedding regularly (ideally daily) to remove any emollient residue. Although washing does not completely remove residue so continue to be vigilant.
- Always cover furniture or airflow cushions with washable throws and clean them frequently.
- Always keep a safe distance from open fires and portable heaters.

- -Always be cautious in the bath or shower, as emollients can make surfaces slippery.
- -Always inform carers, relatives, or anyone in close contact about the risks associated with emollient use. Carers may wish to include this information in a care plan.

Avoid:

- Avoid placing heated appliances such as electric blankets, hairdryers, or straighteners and curling tongs near airflow mattresses and cushions.
- -Avoid drying clothing or bedding close to an open fire or portable heater.

Never:

- Never smoke, or allow others to smoke near you while using these products.
- -Never use a naked flame, such as matches, lighters, or candles, if your clothes, dressings, or bandages may have been in contact with emollients.
- -Never cook while wearing clothing that may have absorbed emollient products.

Additional Precautions

- -If you smoke, use fire-retardant covers, bedding and blankets where possible, and ensure the safe disposal of smoking materials.
- -Treatment is important, but it is also essential to stay safe when these products are being used. Alternative water based products which are safer may be suitable. Seek medical advice before changing any medical products.

Our Roads Policing unit will be actively patrolling key routes, using both marked and unmarked vehicles, to tackle and deter crime and antisocial behaviour .

Superintendent Gary Foster, Neighbourhood Policing and Partnerships, said: "We have implemented Operation Coastline across the Humberside area to ensure our coastal and market towns remain safe from criminality that may be travelling into, and across, our force area during this warmer season.

"As the weather begins to get warmer and the nights become lighter, our coastal areas will start to welcome more visitors, which can sometimes lead to an increase in criminal activity.

"Our Coastal communities can expect to see an increased officer presence, patrolling key locations on foot and engaging with the public to provide reassurance.

"In our continued efforts to keep our communities safe and ensure that residents and visitors, including families, can enjoy the coastal areas within our region, we will be targeting our resources effectively to disrupt criminal activity.

"We are also working closely with our partner agencies during this time, focusing on youth engagement to address antisocial behaviour and promote a safe and welcoming environment for everyone."

Humberside Police and Crime Commissioner Jonathan Evison added: "We are lucky enough to have a number of coastal towns in our area, but with these places comes an influx of visitors in peak periods often leading to an increase in criminality.

"After the success of last year's pilot, I am pleased to support the operation again this year. By having an increased police presence in the hotspot areas, we can keep our residents and visitors safe and allow people to enjoy our coastal areas."

We would always encourage you to report any offences to us so we can build the bigger picture and take action. We are committed as a force to targeting criminality across our area.
